EXPERTS PUSH FOR MODERNIZATION OF THE 1978 EDUCATION ACT

Education stakeholders have urged comprehensive reforms to the Education Act of 1978, calling for the law to explicitly guarantee compulsory education, fee-free schooling, and a legally mandated school feeding programme. The proposal was presented in Dar es Salaam during a consultative meeting convened by the Tanzania Education Network (TEN/MET), which brought together representatives from the education sector and civil society to review the nearly 50-year-old legislation. Participants noted that the current Act no longer reflects the realities of modern education policy, the evolving labour market, or contemporary child protection standards. Speaking at the meeting, Mr. Salehe Bukanu, an education stakeholder from Mwanza Region, urged the Ministry of Education to revisit the regulation of private tuition.

He emphasized concerns that some teachers provide essential curriculum content only during extra paid sessions, disadvantaging pupils who cannot afford these additional classes, especially those from low-income families. Reviewers further noted that the 1978 Education Act predates major demographic changes, global shifts in education standards, and the rapid expansion of secondary education. They stressed that updating the law will determine whether Tanzania strengthens recent gains in educational access or continues to grapple with persistent inequality and weak regulatory enforcement.

AFRICAN UNION TO SHIFT FOCUS TO GREEN, DIGITAL ECONOMY BY 2034.

During the 39th Ordinary Session of the African Union (AU) in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, African leaders introduced a 10-year action plan aimed at positioning the continent as a key driver of the digital era. The plan goes beyond harnessing technology to empowering Africa to create and lead in technological innovation. This transformation is anchored in three major policy frameworks, the African Strategy for Science, Technology, and Innovation (STISA-2034), the Continental Technical and Vocational Training Strategy (2025–2034), and the Continental Education Strategy for Africa (CESA 26–35). Collectively, these initiatives seek to convert Africa's scientific strengths and its large youth population into value created within the continent, shifting away from the historic dependence on exporting raw materials and importing finished products.

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Professor Gaspard Banyankimbona, AU Commissioner for Education, Science, Technology, and Innovation, described the programme as both urgent and transformative. He cautioned that Africa stands at a decisive moment, while emphasizing that failure to invest in the intellectual development of children today will fuel future instability, inequality, and dependency. Meanwhile, AU Commission Chairperson Mr. Mahmoud Ali Youssouf stressed that governance reforms remain central to sustainable progress, noting the importance of the African Peer Review Mechanism (APRM) in strengthening institutional resilience.

TRA URGES TAXPAYERS TO EMBRACE IDRAS FOR TRANSPARENT, EFFICIENT SERVICES.

The Tanzania Revenue Authority (TRA) in Kagera Region has encouraged taxpayers to begin using the newly launched Integrated Domestic Revenue Administration System (IDRAS), noting that it will significantly improve transparency, efficiency, and convenience in tax administration. Speaking during an ongoing taxpayer education seminar held in Bukoba Municipality, Kagera TRA Regional Manager, Mr. Joseph Mutalemwa, emphasized that IDRAS does not alter any existing tax laws or regulations. Instead, it is designed to simplify and modernize tax administration.

Mr. Mutalemwa explained that the goal of IDRAS is to streamline tax services, making it easier for taxpayers to pay government revenue with increased trust and clarity. The system links various institutions directly to taxpayers, enabling them to communicate with TRA officials online without the need for physical visits to TRA offices. The introduction of IDRAS is expected to reduce paperwork, speed up service delivery, minimize congestion at tax offices, and improve transparency in interactions between taxpayers and revenue officials.

COMMISSION CALLS FOR STRINGENT ACTION ON DATA PRIVACY BREACHES

The Personal Data Protection Commission (PDPC) has been urged to take firm legal action against individuals and institutions responsible for leaking private information, to ensure that victims of data breaches receive fair compensation for the financial losses and emotional harm they experience. Mbeya Regional Commissioner, Mr. Beno Malisa, issued the call while officiating a specialized training programme for personal data protection officers drawn from the Southern Highlands zone. The training is part of a wider national initiative aimed at strengthening institutional compliance with the Personal Data Protection Act. RC Malisa stressed that the unauthorized release of personal information is not a minor error or technical oversight but a serious violation that can result in significant social and economic consequences.

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The PDPC's Director General, Dr. Emmanuel Mkilia, explained that the Commission introduced these training sessions to ensure every institution designates a well-trained officer who understands the legal requirements governing the collection, processing, management, and storage of personal data. Dr. Mkilia added that recent audits revealed widespread non-compliance across institutions, with much mishandling of personal information and failure to meet statutory obligations. As a result, numerous cases have emerged where employees' and clients' confidential data were exposed, leading to considerable damage and distress.

GOVERNMENT LAUNCHES DRIVE ON THE NEW MINIMUM WAGE

The government has initiated a nationwide inspection campaign targeting private-sector employers following the announcement of a new statutory minimum wage. The authorities intensify efforts to address early signs of non-compliance before the new rates become fully effective next year. On 17 October 2025, the Minister responsible for Labour, Employment and Industrial Relations announced that the national minimum wage will be increased from TZS 275,060 to TZS 358,322, representing an average adjustment of 33.4 percent. The revised wage structure will take effect on 1 January 2026, in line with the mandatory review of wage regulations first introduced in 2022 and set to expire at the end of this year.

Hon. Deus Sangu, the Minister of State in the Prime Minister's Office (Labour, Industrial Relations), confirmed that labour inspectors have already conducted 1,440 compliance inspections across various regions. Preliminary findings indicate that some employers have not yet begun implementing the new wage order. He further cautioned that a second phase of inspections will be launched soon, with a particular focus on non-compliant employers in key sectors such as transport, communications, hospitality and tourism, mining, manufacturing, private education, energy, marine services, sports and cultural services, among others.

TBS UNVEILS 74 BIOTECHNOLOGY STANDARDS TO STRENGTHEN CONSUMER PROTECTION

The Tanzania Bureau of Standards (TBS) has rolled out 74 new biotechnology standards aimed at enhancing consumer protection, food safety, and industrial quality control across the country. Speaking in Dar es Salaam during the Biotechnology Exhibition, Ms. Neema Kirway, a TBS Quality Control Officer, explained that the event served as an important platform for raising regulatory awareness and promoting knowledge sharing to support innovation and economic development. Ms. Kirway noted that the introduction of these biotechnology standards will subject products to more rigorous quality and safety evaluations before they reach the public. This strengthened oversight, she said, will help curb the distribution of unsafe or substandard goods in the Tanzanian market.

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She further announced that the newly issued standards are now available for purchase at TBS headquarters, a move designed to improve stakeholder access and encourage broader compliance within the biotechnology and industrial sectors.

CONSTRUCTION, TRANSPORT TOP TAX EVASION LIST, SAYS TRA BOSS

The Tanzania Revenue Authority (TRA) has pinpointed several key areas where tax evasion is most prevalent, particularly in receipt issuance, payroll declarations, and taxation of imported goods. These insights were highlighted during the opening of a new TRA Tax Center in Masaki, an initiative aimed at improving accessibility to services and strengthening tax compliance nationwide. Speaking at the event, Acting Commissioner for Operations, Mr. Charles Mabula, noted that several traders continue to avoid their tax obligations by failing to issue electronic fiscal receipts (EFRs), despite this being a legal requirement. As a result, substantial revenue that should be collected from the sale of goods and services is lost.

To address this challenge, Mr. Mabula announced the rollout of the IDRAS tax system, designed to support taxpayers who do not possess electronic fiscal devices. Through IDRAS, such traders will be able to generate legally compliant receipts at no cost. According to him, the system will boost transparency, enhance the accuracy of business records, and simplify tax reporting. He further revealed that TRA investigations in recent years have exposed an increase in complex tax-evasion schemes, particularly in the construction, transport, and import sectors. Some operators have been found using shell companies, submitting forged documents, and hiding transactions to deliberately understate their revenue and reduce tax liabilities. Mr. Mabula affirmed that TRA remains committed to identifying and dismantling these schemes to protect public revenue and ensure fair competition in the marketplace.

TCRA INITIATES MAJOR REGULATORY OVERHAUL TO UPDATE POSTAL SECTOR

The Tanzania Communications Regulatory Authority (TCRA) has initiated a comprehensive review of the legal and regulatory framework governing the postal sector. The objective of this reform is to accommodate new business models, strengthen service quality, and ensure the long-term sustainability of postal services amid rapid technological advancements. Speaking recently in Dar es Salaam, TCRA Director General Dr. Jabiri Bakari stated that the review is a strategic response to the fast-changing digital landscape. The announcement also aligns with the celebration of the 46th anniversary of the Pan African Postal Union (PAPU) this month. Dr. Bakari underscored the importance of the postal sector, describing it as “vital to inclusive national growth” and a key connector between consumers and businesses.

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He noted that the postal system plays an increasingly critical role in the digital economy, particularly in supporting e-commerce through reliable last-mile delivery, including to rural and underserved communities. To fully unlock these opportunities, Dr. Bakari emphasized the need for stronger collaboration between government institutions, private courier operators, and digital service platforms, stressing that such partnerships are essential for modernizing and future-proofing the sector.

TRA WARNS TRADERS ON SELF-DECEPTION TRAP

The Commissioner General of the Tanzania Revenue Authority (TRA), Mr. Yusuph Mwenda, has issued a strong warning to traders who brokers are misleading into believing that their tax debts can be written off. He emphasized that tax debts cannot simply disappear and that the only lawful ways to eliminate them are through full payment or by successfully challenging the assessment in court. Speaking during the launch of the Masaki Customer Service Centre in Kinondoni District, Dar es Salaam, an office expected to serve more than 6,000 taxpayers, Mr. Mwenda cautioned traders who rely on street-level brokers and middlemen who falsely promise that debts can be cancelled through unofficial means.

He described such beliefs as self-deception and a complete waste of time, urging traders facing challenges to visit TRA offices directly for proper assistance. He also addressed a common misconception among small traders that large businesses do not pay the taxes due from them. Mr. Mwenda clarified that this assumption is false and underscored that the establishment of the Masaki Customer Service Centre serves as clear evidence that even large taxpayers meet their obligations just like everyone else.

TANZANIA ATTRACTS GLOBAL INVESTORS IN THE MINING SECTOR

GOVERNMENT REVIEWING CURRENT SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY POLICY OF 1996

The government has begun reviewing the 1996 National Science and Technology Policy to ensure it aligns with the country's long-term development agenda. This was revealed by Mr. Edwin Konzo, the Coordinator for Science, Technology and Innovation at the Ministry of Education, Science and Technology, during a high-level Tanzania-Japan knowledge-sharing forum focused on strategies to boost agricultural productivity. Mr. Konzo explained that the upcoming policy overhaul aims to modernize the legal and institutional framework governing scientific research and innovation, ensuring it supports the ambitions of Development Vision 2050.

He emphasized that Tanzania must significantly expand investment in technology and innovation if it is to meet the economic and industrial expectations of the 21st century. At the same forum, Prof. Amandus Muhairwa, Deputy Vice Chancellor of Sokoine University of Agriculture (SUA), highlighted the impact of rapid urbanization, noting that shrinking arable land underscores the urgency of adopting modern agricultural technologies. Stakeholders further observed that the government's plan to establish 1,000 agricultural mechanization hubs will be transformative, helping reduce post-harvest losses, speeding up cultivation, and making modern equipment more accessible to farmers.

CONTAINER DEPOTS TO WORK 24/7 AS TRA CEO WARNS ON EVADING TAXES

The Tanzania Revenue Authority (TRA) has announced new measures aimed at improving operational efficiency by allowing dry ports to operate on a 24-hour basis. The initiative seeks to reduce delays in cargo clearance and strengthen Tanzania's competitiveness against other major regional ports. TRA Commissioner General Mr. Yusuph Mwenda revealed the plan during a meeting with Inland Container Depot (ICD) operators in Dar es Salaam, urging them to embrace round-the-clock operations as TRA increases staffing to support the extended hours. He emphasized that ICD operators will need to upgrade their facilities and systems to align with the new operational demands.

In response, Mr. Meleck Shangwe, Chairman of the Inland Container Depots Association (ICDA), said the meeting provided an opportunity for ICD operators to raise their challenges, stressing the significant role ICDs play, contributing 52 percent of all customs revenue. However, the TRA Commissioner General also issued a stern warning, noting that some ICD operators have been engaging in tax evasion through various schemes. He assured that TRA is closely monitoring these violations and will take firm, decisive action to ensure full compliance with tax laws.

COURT ADOPTS AI, INTEGRATED DATA SYSTEMS

The Judiciary of Tanzania has begun implementing AI-powered transcription technology to assist in drafting court judgments, a development expected to dramatically cut writing time and improve case-processing efficiency. This was revealed by Chief Court Administrator Prof. Elisante Ole Gabriel during the 6th e-Government Annual Meeting held in Arusha. According to Prof. Gabriel, the pilot initiative introduced in 2024 across 11 judicial zones has transformed the judgment-writing process. Previously, judges had to manually draft lengthy decisions, sometimes exceeding 200 pages. With the new system, judges simply dictate their judgments, and the Transcription and Translation Software (TTS) automatically transcribes and translates the text into either Kiswahili or English.

Technology reduces paperwork, minimizes physical strain, and allows judicial officers to focus more on analysis rather than manual writing. Prof. Gabriel noted that the Judiciary is currently running over 17 digital programs, with nearly 90 percent centered on ICT systems and capacity-building for judicial personnel. He emphasized that the success of digital transformation in the justice sector depends on visionary leadership and sustained investment in ICT talent. He stressed, underscoring the need for skilled professionals to support long-term technological advancement.

CIVIL SERVANTS WARNED AGAINST USING INFORMAL EMAILS FOR GOVERNMENT COMMUNICATIONS

The government has issued a stern warning to all civil servants, directing them to stop using informal or personal email platforms for official communication. Officials stressed that relying on such platforms puts the confidentiality of sensitive government documents and personal information at risk. Delivering the caution during the closing ceremony of the 6th Government Annual Meeting in Arusha, the Minister of State in the President's Office (Public Service Management and Good Governance), Hon. Ridhiwani Kikwete, expressed serious concern over the persistent habit of public employees using private email accounts to transmit official documents. He noted that this practice significantly increases the likelihood of government data being leaked or exposed online.

He further emphasized the growing importance of cybersecurity, especially in an era where cyberattacks and digital threats are becoming more frequent and sophisticated. He urged heads of public institutions to ensure that their staff are adequately trained in information technology, underscoring that digital competence is essential if the public service is to keep pace with rapid technological advancements.

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
