COURT DISMISSES APPEAL AGAINST DEATH SENTENCE

The Court of Appeal has dismissed an appeal filed by carpenter Mr. Alex Julius, thereby upholding the death sentence imposed after his conviction for murdering his lover, Ms. Kudura Hamis. On April 10, 2026, a three-judge bench comprising Justices Lugano Mwandambo, Abraham Mwampashi, and Lameck Mlacha held that the prosecution had proved the case beyond a reasonable doubt through strong and consistent circumstantial evidence. Reading the judgment, Justice Mwampashi said the court found no legal errors in the High Court's decision after reviewing all grounds of appeal and the evidence presented.

The court further noted that unchallenged medical evidence established that the deceased died an unnatural death caused by strangulation and upheld the application of the "last seen with the deceased" doctrine, observing that the appellant failed to give a satisfactory account of the victim's final moments. Judges concluded that the circumstantial evidence formed a complete and unbroken chain, pointing exclusively to the appellant. Mr. Julius had been convicted by the High Court under Section 196 of the Penal Code [Cap 16 R.E 2019] after the prosecution, relying on eight witnesses and two exhibits, alleged that he killed Ms. Kudura, a bar attendant, last seen alive on September 15, 2020, in his company, as he routinely picked her up from work.

GOVERNMENT STUDIES PROPOSALS FOR FUEL LEVY WAIVER, SUBSIDIES

The government has stated that it will not be pressured into making hasty fiscal decisions that could destabilize the economy as it conducts a comprehensive assessment on how best to mitigate rising fuel costs. Prime Minister Hon. Dr. Mwigulu Nchemba made the remarks while addressing residents of Chamwino, emphasizing that the government is prioritizing a strategic and measured approach to ensure that any intervention does not create friction between service providers and the public.

He cautioned that although various proposals have been submitted by stakeholders and political groups, including calls to cut taxes or remove levies, acting without thorough evaluation could deepen the crisis or benefit a small group of profiteers. Dr. Nchemba stressed that the current economic environment requires professional scrutiny rather than panic, drawing parallels with how Tanzania navigated the COVID-19 pandemic and foreign exchange shortages through carefully calibrated responses. He added that the government is holding daily meetings with key sector stakeholders to ensure fuel availability and prevent artificial shortages, while warning that some advice from critics may be driven by hidden agendas or specific business interests.

DIGITAL SYSTEM TO BOOST PROCUREMENT TRANSPARENCY

The Public Procurement Appeals Authority (PPAA) has announced that a new digital module is being introduced under the National e-Procurement System of Tanzania (NeST). The system will significantly enhance accountability, transparency, and efficiency within the national supply chain. Speaking at the launch of the National Supply Chain Management Policy 2025 in Dodoma, PPAA Executive Secretary, Mr. James Sando, said the module will link suppliers with procuring entities, improving the management and resolution of procurement-related disputes.

He noted that, as a key oversight body in public procurement, the PPAA will benefit from the system's ability to enable fair and timely decisions, ensuring government projects are implemented as planned. Mr. Sando added that the new module will reduce operational costs, save time, and strengthen record management, particularly in handling appeals related to public tenders. ANTI-DRUGS AUTHORITY IMPOUNDS NEARLY TWO TONNES OF NARCOTICS

Tanzania anti-narcotics authorities seized nearly two tonnes of illicit drugs in March this year, destroyed cannabis farms, and arrested dozens of suspects in a series of nationwide operations that highlight changing drug trafficking patterns across the country. The Drug Control and Enforcement Authority (DCEA) Commissioner General, Mr. Aretas Lymo, said officers confiscated 1,983.31 kilogrammes of various narcotic substances during the month. The operations also led to the seizure of 3,012.5 kilogrammes and 17,960 litres of precursor chemicals commonly used in the manufacture of illegal drugs. In addition, law enforcement officers seized 286 tablets and 1,001 bottles of controlled medicinal drugs.

Mr. Lymo said authorities destroyed 55.5 acres of cannabis farms across the country and arrested 77 suspects in connection with drug-related offences. During the operations, officers also impounded nine vehicles, 12 motorcycles, and one three-wheeled vehicle believed to have been used in drug trafficking activities. He attributed the rise in seizures to intensified enforcement efforts in rural areas, following significant progress in dismantling organised networks previously associated with industrial-scale narcotics trafficking. According to Mr. Lymo, in Dar es Salaam, officers intercepted 101.2 kilogrammes of mirungi concealed inside a passenger bus in Tegeta Kibo. The drugs had been hidden in multiple compartments of the bus, including the air-conditioning system, during a journey from Mombasa to Dar es Salaam. Five suspects, including the driver and the conductor, were arrested in connection with the incident as investigations continue.

WEAK SYSTEMS DRAINING BILLIONS IN NON-TAX REVENUE COLLECTIONS

Tanzania is losing billions of shillings in potential revenue from fees, licences, and other non-tax sources due to weak systems, poor coordination, and limited enforcement, a new performance audit has revealed. The findings have raised concerns about the government's ability to effectively mobilise domestic resources. The audit, conducted under Section 28 of the Public Audit Act, [Cap. 418 R.E 2023], assessed the management of non-tax revenue by the Ministry of Finance over the period 2021/22 to 2024/25. It found persistent underperformance in non-tax revenue collection despite ongoing reforms and efforts to digitalise revenue systems.

According to the Controller and Auditor General (CAG), Mr. Charles Kichere, non-tax revenue currently accounts for only 6 to 6.9 percent of the national budget, a level considered low compared with the potential average of 6.2 percent of GDP across Africa. He noted that collections have consistently fallen short of targets. Mr. Kichere said that in the 2023/24 fiscal year, non-tax revenue amounted to Sh3.9 trillion against a target of Sh5 trillion, representing an achievement rate of 77.8

percent. Annual shortfalls over the past four years have ranged from TZS. 0.5 trillion to TZS. 1.1 trillion. The audit further identified the informal sector as a major untapped source of non-tax revenue.

The Report noted that weak enforcement mechanisms and fragmented revenue collection systems have allowed many businesses to remain outside the revenue net, limiting the government's capacity to maximise collections. The report also calls for stronger coordination among government institutions, improved enforcement, and the integration of revenue systems to enhance the efficiency and accountability of non-tax revenue management.

Speaking at the official launch, the Coast Region Assistant Administrative Secretary for Industry, Trade and Investment, Ms. Ritta Magere, said the establishment of the office is an important step toward increasing efficiency for factory owners and producers of various goods in the Coast Region and neighbouring areas. She noted that the new office aims to enhance compliance with national quality standards in the production of goods nationwide, thereby promoting consumer safety and strengthening industrial performance.

During the launch event, TBS issued 143 certificates and licences to product manufacturers in the Eastern Zone, which includes the regions of Coast, Morogoro, and Tanga. TBS Director General, Dr. Ashura Katunzi, said the organisation continues to bring its services closer to communities to reduce the burden faced by producers who previously had to travel long distances, particularly to Dar es Salaam, to access certification and standard-related services. According to Dr. Katunzi, decentralizing services not only lowers operational costs for producers but also encourages wider compliance with quality standards, supporting industrial growth and consumer protection.

The statement informed the public that the reports are now publicly accessible to support parliamentary scrutiny and citizen oversight.

The CAG emphasized that it is essential for all stakeholders within the accountability framework to fulfill their responsibilities in line with the principles of transparency, accountability, and institutional integrity to enhance government performance and strengthen public trust.

TRA ISSUES STERN WARNING TO TAX EVADERS IN LAKE ZONE

The Commissioner General of the Tanzania Revenue Authority (TRA), Mr. Yusuph Mwenda, has issued a stern warning to tax evaders in the Lake Zone, cautioning that although they may attempt to avoid detection, they will ultimately be held accountable. Speaking during a meeting with taxpayers in Bunda District, Mara Region, Mr. Mwenda stated that the authority will take legal action against individuals and businesses involved in tax evasion, noting that the practice undermines fair competition and unfairly burdens compliant taxpayers. He urged the public to report offenders, stressing that tax evaders cannot evade obligations indefinitely.

Mr. Mwenda also warned traders engaged in smuggling through the Sirari border and other entry points, saying enforcement measures have been intensified to curb illicit trade. In addition, he issued a one-month ultimatum to a contractor delaying the completion of a TRA office construction project in Sengerema, warning that failure to meet the deadline would result in further action, including a review of the firm's eligibility for future TRA contracts, and directed that no new contracts be awarded pending an internal performance assessment. CMA TO EMPLOYMENT RESPECTS THE RIGHTS OF DOMESTIC WORKERS

The Commission for Mediation and Arbitration (CMA) has urged employers to comply with labour laws and prescribed procedures when engaging domestic workers to reduce disputes and workplace conflicts. Speaking at the opening of a training session for about 50 employers and domestic workers organized by the International Labour Organization (ILO), CMA Director Mr. Usekele Mpulla emphasized that domestic workers are protected under national labour laws and are entitled to the same legal safeguards as other categories of workers. He noted that a household is legally recognized as a workplace and must therefore meet basic employment standards.

Mr. Mpulla further explained that domestic workers have the right to lodge complaints with the CMA whenever their rights are violated, adding that although ILO Convention No. 189 is still in the process of ratification, existing national labour laws already provide adequate protection for domestic workers.

GOVERNMENT REVOKES 40 MINING LICENCES, RECLAIMS 188,163 ACRES

The government has revoked 40 mineral prospecting licences after their holders failed to comply with regulations governing Tanzania's mining sector, including the requirement to develop the licensed areas. As a result, the government has reclaimed a combined area of about 188,163 acres (approximately 900 square kilometres) from undeveloped licence holdings. Minister for Minerals, Hon. Anthony Mavunde, announced the decision in Dodoma, noting that the Mining Commission has also issued notices of default to 43 additional licence holders, comprising 40 prospecting licences and three medium-scale mining licences.

The cited violations include licence hoarding, failure to pay statutory fees, non-compliance with local content obligations, and poor performance in fulfilling corporate social responsibility (CSR) commitments. Hon. Mavunde directed the Mining Commission to continue conducting regular inspections and issuing default notices, stressing that licences should be revoked and the areas reallocated to other investors if the identified shortcomings are not rectified within 30 days. He further stated that the government is closely monitoring gold rush incidents across the country and will take appropriate action against licence holders who remain non-compliant despite receiving default notices.

PUBLIC INVESTMENTS OVERHAUL, GOVERNMENT TO SET BILL, FISCAL 2026/27

The government plans to finalize the long-awaited Public Investments Bill in the 2026/2027 financial year, to overhaul the management and performance of state-owned institutions. Minister of State for Planning and Investment in the President's Office, Hon. Prof. Kitila Mkumbo, outlined the proposal while presenting his ministry's draft budget of TZS 144.85 billion in Dodoma. He said the Bill is intended to strengthen the performance, accountability, and economic impact of public institutions by aligning them with Tanzania's long-term development objectives under Vision 2050.

The proposed law introduces a modern framework for overseeing public assets, including the establishment of a Public Investments Management Authority to coordinate government investments under a unified national strategy, reduce inefficiencies, and maximize returns. A key feature of the Bill is the creation of a Public Investments Fund, which will enable state-owned enterprises (SOEs) to mobilize capital independently of the Consolidated Fund, a move the government believes will unlock new financing opportunities for industrial growth while safeguarding overall fiscal stability.

COURT DISMISSES LAND CASE AS HEIRS LACK LOCUS STANDI

The High Court has reaffirmed that heirs who have not been formally appointed as legal administrators lack locus standi to institute legal proceedings concerning a deceased person's property. The ruling arose from Land Case No. 11429 of 2025, filed by Bukoba residents Mr. Wilbard and Mr. Patrick Mwombeki, who sought to sue the Chief Executive Officer of the Tanzania National Roads Agency (TANROADS) and the Attorney General. The plaintiffs challenged a demolition notice issued in respect of premises located in Bukoba Township, held under Certificate of Title No. 003005/38, arguing that although the building was alleged to encroach on a road reserve, no full, fair, and prompt compensation had been paid.

During the hearing of a Preliminary Objection, State Attorney Mr. Nestory Lutambi, representing the defendants, contended that the court lacked jurisdiction because the plaintiffs lacked legal standing to sue over property belonging to their deceased father, the late John Mwombeki. In his ruling, Hon. Judge Ferdinand Kiwonde cited established Court of Appeal precedent, emphasizing that heirs, even where they have an interest in the estate of a deceased person, must comply with legal procedures conferring locus standi before initiating proceedings. The judge stressed that heirs who have neither inherited the property nor been appointed as administrators of the estate lack the legal capacity to institute proceedings relating to a deceased person's property.
